After reading the article about slowing reforms due to teacher resistance, we have some dissenting opinions we'd like to share. Fundamentally, your research was conducted with the incorrect set of participant survey groups. We are of the opinion that those groups surveyed are the cause of slowing reforms and have used teachers as a convenient scapegoat to air their grievances concerning technology use.

The "blue ribbon panel" was "commissioned and paid for by a consortium of leading technology manufacturers" which leads one to believe the results of the panel were clearly biased toward those funding the survey. It was also mentioned that parents groups are "upset about the apparent waste of their tax dollars" but they seem just fine wasting funding that could be put toward valuable research for what teachers need.

It would be more beneficial to survey teachers to see what was needed instead of forcing unsolicited goods into the hands of already overwhelmed educators. It is well known that software developers' goal is to make sales, parents are more willing to offload blame for failing students and administrators are concerned with scores. It seems as though the focus of the study was more about degrading teaching instead of working to correct the perceived technological gaps.
